Neighbourhood Survey Results

March - April 2014

Introduction

The Stowey Sutton Neighbourhood Plan team distributed a survey to all 546 homes in the parish, the survey, prepared by the neighbourhood plan working parties covered the areas of Community & Recreation, Roads & Transport and Business & Employment. Surveys were delivered at the end of March 2014, with a closing date of Friday 11th April.

Surveys were distributed with reply paid envelopes, which were used by the majority of respondents, with a small number hand delivering completed forms to the Clerk or Chairman's address's.

The survey was publicised by the Parish Council at their March meeting, on their website & in their monthly email newsletter, posters were placed around the parish, an entry was made on a popular community Facebook page & the public engagement team raised awareness with residents on the street.

Additional copies of the survey were available on the Parish Council & neighbourhood plan website & by request to members of the team.

A total of 151 responses were received, 27.7% of the homes in the surveyed area (2011 Census).

The survey responses were keyed by the Stowey Sutton Parish Clerk & verified by a volunteer.

Analysis of the data was completed by Marc Betton BSc (Hons) MSc MRes.

Marc followed his Batchelor's degree in Software Engineering with a Masters in Management, before completing a Masters in Research at the University of Bath in 2013.

The responses were analysed, summarised and graphically represented.

The three open text response questions were heuristically analysed with a three-round, two-tiered, common-sense, coding system.

What specific improvements would you like to see in Stowey Sutton & the wider community in the context of future growth of the community?

This question was presented as an open box in which respondents could write as much or as little as they wanted.

The results were analysed heuristically using a three-round, twotiered, common-sense coding system. The top tiered themes are presented here. Some of the themes are more relevant to different questions.

While there may have been some confusion over the 'context of future growth', it is clear that public transport, roads, schools, recreation and shops & facilities are of the most importance to the respondents. These themes are explored in the following pages.

On this question there was a strong call for improvements to the local broadband service, which tallies with the response to the earlier question about paying an additional council tax fee to improve the infrastructure. There also appears to be a small, but notable group calling for more community events.

While appearing more substantial as a group, the 'specific requests' theme contains a number of comments with little commonality, such as "*fewer security lights on homes* " & a reduction of "*sign polution* ".



There is a surprisingly strong call for better public transport from the village, not only to more destinations, but with greater frequency, particularly for commuters (although this this conclusion is drawn from a later question). Bath & a hub location, such as the A37 or Pensford, to allow access to wider bus networks are particularly popular. As a whole, 23 respondents requested a varient of 'more busses' for this question.



There is a considerable call for traffic calming measures along the A368 in Bishop Sutton, particularly around the school & at the periphery of the village. Requests for road crossings at the school or the shop might accommodate this. There is also a strong call for better pavements throughout the village & out to Manor Farm Shop. Parking, particularly around the shop is also apparently insufficient.



While the overall sentiment is that both the pre-school & primary school in the village are above average, there are strong calls to improve both. This includes the facilities, the buildings & the location. This may be partly based on a perceived influx of children to newly permitted housing developments. There is also a general feeling that pre & after school groups should be encouraged, along with a nursery.



The majority of comments call for improvements to existing play areas, although more recreation space & leisure facilities are also popular. Many respondents requested facilities for older children & teenagers, which may offset the need for more play areas for younger children. A new skate park was only mentioned specifically by two respondents. There was a similar level of interest in a new Scout hut.



While many respondents asked for more shops in the village, there is a strong feeling that the existing store could be greatly enhanced to better suit the needs of the village. The range of goods could be widened considerably with greater stocks & it is felt that the cost of some goods is too high. Many of the requests for more shops specifically mention that increased competition would aid this. There is also a general call for more unspecified facilities.

In your household or business, how many journeys starting from your home or business are made during an average week:

Due to the detailed nature of the responses to this question, the results have been amalgamated into a series of graphs summarising the data by journey purpose & method. The overall impression is that the vast majority of journeys are currently completed by private vehicle. From the responses to later questions, there is clearly a perception in the minds of respondents, that if it became more available & reliable, then public transport would be used for many of these journeys instead.

146 respondents, 96.7%, answered this question.

These figures must be interpreted carefully, as it is possible that multiple members of a household or business may have responded, although this is minimised by the distribution method of the survey.

How can the parish council & / or local authority encourage people to use forms of transport other than the car? In descending order of priority.

It is unsurprising that the most popular method of encouraging people out of cars is to use public transport. But as has already been mentioned & will be seen on the next page, there is an overwhelming feeling that the current public transport provisions are inadequate.

Of the remaining themes, three respondents wish to see a reduction in the number of villagers driving their children to school in the village, while others would like to see a community 'car-share' to specific events & destinations. One respondent highlighted the lack of medical facilities in the village, leading people to need a car to reach facilities in the local area. A similar response was made that a car is needed to commute to work.

Half of all responses to this question simply asked for a better bus service, while the majority of the rest specified where they want more to go. It is not surprising that Bristol is a popular location, particularly for commuters, or that more people specifically mention Bath, which is currently served by only one bus per week.

Hub locations, such as the A368 or Pensford, are also popular as a means to open the Parish to a wider network of public transport.

'Other' locations include Wells, Midsomer Norton & wider destinations. There is also a general call for better links within Chew Valley, though these may be served by existing bus routes to other locations, such as Bristol, whose route includes many neighbouring villages.

Many respondents specifically mentioned that bus timetables should allow for commuting, particularly to Bristol & Bath, which would reduce the need to drive to work. There was a general feeling that the existing Bristol bus did not allow this. It was also suggested that busses could put be put on for commuter times to park & ride schemes.

It is unexpected that so many respondents felt that the existing bus timetables were not sufficiently promoted & as a result the Parish Council has already taken steps to rectify this by including both short & detailed timetables on their website.

Roads & Transport



There is an overwhelming feeling that pavements throughout the Parish are insufficient, not only along the A368 in Bishop Sutton, but to link Stowey & Manor Farm Shop. Even areas with pavements saw calls to widen them. Street lights, particularly at junctions were also mentioned, presumably to improve pedestrian safety, given the nature of the question.



Improvements to cycling routes are particularly popular throughout the Parish & neighbouring area. Any such improvements would likely also assist the considerable group looking for better facilites for walkers. It is interesting that in addition to general 'improve cycle/walk routes' comments, a substantial number of respondents particularly feel that a new path should be opened around the entire lake, reducing the need to use roads.



If the parish had its own budget for improvement & development of transport infrastructure, which three specific projects would you recommend?

Given the responses to earlier questions, it is unsurprising that the majority of respondents feel a 'Parish budget' for transport should focus on improving public transport. This theme, along with roads & walking/cycling facilites are explored overleaf.

It appears that some respondents did not take-onboard the 'development of transport infrastructure' nature of the question, suggesting general projects for improvements in the Parish, although in one case the reference to improving broadband was specified "*rather than for transport* ".

Many of these responses follow earlier statements, such as investing in the schools or play areas.

The specific requests include improving drainage to prevent flooding & calls to make Ham Lane one way, along with a weight restriction on traffic through Stowey. One respondent wanted the Parish budget spent on reducing anti-social behaviour, while another simply suggested "*park & ride*", though it is unclear whether they want a shuttle bus to park & ride services, or the Parish to have a park & ride scheme all of its own.



It is unsurprising that this question echoes the response to the previous, with the majority of respondents calling for general improvements to public transport. Bath is the most popular destination, likely due to the limitations of the current service, while broadening the number of routes & linking to hub locations are equally popular.



Of the top three categories, improvements to road surfaces & fixing potholes received the majority of references, though it is unclear whether this is along the A368 or elsewhere in the Parish. The widening-of & additional pavements along the A368 & out to Stowey & Manor Farm Shop was popular. Traffic calming along the A368 received much attention, though no specific plan was given. There is also a call for better parking at the shop.



The response to this question also echoes the previous sentiment with a majority of respondents looking for improvements to cycling facilities, which may of course cover the needs of walkers. The call for a route around the lake is still strong.



Are there enough cafes, pubs or eateries in Stowey Sutton?

142 respondents, 94.0%, answered this question.

There is almost an equal split between respondents who believe there are enough eateries in the Parish & those who feel the opposite, with a strong majority suggesting the addition of cafes.

There appears to have been some confusion over this question as many of the 'other' responses include unrelated suggests, such as "shops" & even a "supermarket". Four respondents suggests some form of take-away, with one specifying a take-away "that delivers".

135 respondents, 89.4%, answered this question.

It is interesting to note that tourism & leisure employment is so popular with respondents, given the few opportunities for tourism providers in the Parish.

'Other' responses include the extremes "any" & "none", the latter response being tied to similar comments against any form of development throughout the survey. "Farming", "working from home" & general "small business employment" were also included.

139 respondents, 92.1%, answered this question.

This question demonstrates the strong demand for improved broadband services with 41.2% of respondents highlighting the need. Improvements to transport links echo the responses to previous questions.

The 'other' responses showed no consensus with suggestions such as "parking" & "relaxed planning consent" meeting "less housing" & "everything".

It is possible that there was some confusion over this question as it does not specify to 'tick all that apply' although that is how it was treated by most respondents. Indeed the wording 'what would encourage' would perhaps be better as 'which would most encourage' since it could be argued that each of the options would encourage businesses to the area.



If you run a business in the parish, work from home, or would like to, is the currently available broadband sufficient for your needs?

This question was the least answered, with only 83 responses, but this is not unexpected due to the wording. While a small minority feel their broadband is adequate, the vast majority, 65.1%, find existing broadband to limiting to their businesses & opportunities.
